Outline of Pupil Premium Spending 2014 -2015

The Pupil Premium is allocated to children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for Free School Meals in both mainstream and non-mainstream schools, as well as those children who have been in Looked After care continuously for more than six months. It was introduced in April 2011, and paid to local authorities by means of a specific grant based on the School census figures for pupils registered as eligible for Free School Meals from Reception age to Year 11.

The premium for 2011-12 was originally set at £488 per eligible pupil, increasing to £600 per eligible pupil in 2012 -13 and then £900 per eligible pupil for 2013-2014. Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit. However, the funding is intended to support pupils from low-income families, with an emphasis on raising attainment. New measures will be included in the annual performance tables that will capture the achievement of those deprived pupils covered by the Pupil Premium. From September 2012, schools are required to publish online information about how they have used the Premium. This will ensure that parents and others are made fully aware of the attainment of pupils covered by the Premium.

Aims:

- to raise attainment and aspiration
- to reduce the attainment gap between the highest and lowest achieving pupils nationally
- to increase social mobility
- to enable more pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds to get to University
- to provide additional resource to schools to do this

A large proportion of the Pupil Premium has been dedicated to the budget for Teaching Assistants and Supply teacher costs for specific duties in supporting targeted children.

School appointed an Inclusion Coordinator in September 2014. Her role is varied but includes supporting identified children who have specific barriers to learning e.g. SEND and behaviour. She also leads strategies and programmes which support children's emotional and mental health e.g. Emotional resilience, friendship groups, counselling.

The premium will be used to broaden children's horizons and give them an experience both environmental and cultural which they may otherwise not have. This includes music and Educational visits. The school subsidised a number of visits or cultural experiences: Theatre visit to the Customs House as well as a residential trip to Thurston in Cumbria.

In 2013- 2014 the use of the premium helped positively impact on the targeted children in their end of key Stage Assessments. The attainment of Pupil Premium children was in line with the attainment of Non Pupil Premium children.
