Topics	What impact did the First World War have on the people involved in it?	What consequences did Hitler's rise to power have for the wider world?	Why do we remember World War Two?	How did International Relations change during the 20 <sup>th</sup> Century?	What was Whitechapel like in the 1900s?
What will students learn during this unit?	Students will start the scheme of work by investigating the causes of the war and will then move on to look at how the war was fought focusing on what trench warfare was and the impact this had on those fighting. Students will then look at the Battle of the Somme and the reasons why this cost so many people their lives. Then students will look at the end of the war and how we remember those who sacrificed their life including those soldiers from the Denton area.	Students will learn about the Treaty of Versailles and the impact this had on Germany. Student will then look at the growing support for Hitler and the reasons why the Nazi party were able to take control of Germany. Students will then study the impact this support had on the people living in Germany including the Wannsee Conference and the Holocaust. Students will then study the reasons why World War Two broke out.	Students will study the impact World War Two had on the people living in Britain and Manchester during the time and the key battles of World War Two such as Pearl Harbour, Stalingrad, D-Day and the reasons why the atomic bomb was dropped. Students will also learn about the work of Alan Turing and how the end of the war was negotiated.	Students will learn about the developing relations between countries such as Russia and America during the 20 <sup>th</sup> Century which ultimately lead to a Cold War. Students will investigate the reasons for an arms race between these two countries and this impact this had on other countries in Eastern Europe. Students will also learn about the Vietnam War and the reasons for America's involvement. Finally students will learn about the building and falling of the Berlin Wall.	Students will learn about what it was like to live in Whitechapel in the 1800s and how these conditions causes a high rate of crime, with a focus on Jack the Ripper and the efforts of the police to try and catch this serial killer.
